Financial Statement Report

Summary

The audit of the accompanying basic financial statements of the Northeastern Illinois University Foundation (Foundation) was performed by E.C. Ortiz and Co., LLP.

Based on their audit, the auditors expressed an unqualified opinion on the Foundation's basic financial statements.

The auditors' report on the supplementary information presented in this section states that it has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in the auditors' opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

Summary of Finding

The auditors identified a matter involving the Foundation's internal control over financial reporting that they considered to be a significant deficiency. The significant deficiency is described in the accompanying Schedule of Finding on pages 29-30 of this report, as finding 07-01, Failure to Apply Appropriate Accounting Principles. The auditors also consider finding 07-01 to be a material weakness.

Independent Auditors' Report

Honorable William G. Holland Auditor General State of Illinois

As Special Assistant Auditors for the Auditor General, we have audited the accompanying financial statements of the business-type activities of Northeastern Illinois University Foundation (Foundation), a component unit of Northeastern Illinois University and the State of Illinois, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2007, which comprise the Foundation's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Foundation's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. The prior year partial comparative information has been derived from the Foundation's 2006 financial statements and, in our report dated October 20, 2006 we expressed an unqualified opinion on those statements.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the business-type activities of Northeastern Illinois University Foundation as of June 30, 2007 and the changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated October 26, 2007 on our consideration of the Foundation's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of the Foundation's compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

The Management's Discussion and Analysis on pages 5 to 8 is not a required part of the basic financial statements but is supplementary information required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Foundation's basic financial statements. The Schedule of Changes in Net Assets for the Year Ended June 30, 2007, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. The Schedule of Changes in Net Assets for the Year Ended June 30, 2007 has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

State of Illinois Northeastern Illinois University Foundation Management's Discussion and Analysis For the Year Ended June 30, 2007

The purpose of this analysis is to provide an objective and easy-to-read analysis of the Foundation's financial activities based on currently known facts, decisions, and/or conditions. The Statement of Net Assets; Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets; Statement of Cash Flows; and Notes to Financial Statements are required by Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 35, Basic Financial Statements – and Management's Discussion and Analysis – for Public Colleges and Universities; GASB Statement No. 37, Basic Financial Statements – Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments: Omnibus; and GASB Statement No. 38, Certain Financial Statement Note Disclosures.

This report presents management's discussion and analysis of the Foundation's financial performance during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2007.

Financial Highlights

Statement of Net Assets

The Statement of Net Assets presents the assets, liabilities and net assets of the Foundation as of the end of the fiscal year (essentially a fiscal snapshot of the Foundation as of that point in time). Readers are able to determine the assets available to continue the Foundation's operations as well as determine the amount the Foundation owes its vendors. Net assets are divided into two major categories, restricted and unrestricted. Restricted net assets are further divided into expendable and nonexpendable. Expendable restricted net assets are available for expenditure but must be expended for the purposes imposed by the donors. The corpus of nonexpendable restricted net assets is not available for expenditure. Unrestricted net assets are available to the Foundation for any lawful purpose of the Foundation.

Total assets of the Northeastern Illinois University Foundation increased 34.4% in fiscal year 2007. This is mainly attributable to increase in investments due to the receipt of GEAR UP funds to establish a scholarship and increase in market value of investments.

The Foundation uses its assets to support excellence in Northeastern Illinois University (NEIU) programs and scholarships in accordance with the wishes of the donors. Net assets represent the residual interest in the Foundation's assets after liabilities are deducted. The Foundation's net assets at June 30, 2007 and 2006 are summarized below. They are grouped by those net assets available for unrestricted uses, those restricted by the donor for particular purpose expenditures (expendable), and assets that are to be held in perpetuity (nonexpendable).

During the year ended June 30, 2007, the Foundation's net assets increased by \$494,267 or 13.8%. In comparing fiscal years 2007 and 2006, the dramatic increase in net assets is attributable to an increase in investment income as well as an increase in private contributions. The Foundation received several large gifts and bequests in support of various programs and scholarships in 2007.

Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets

The purpose of the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets is to present the revenues received by the Foundation, both operating and non-operating, and expenses paid by the Foundation.

Factors Affecting the Future

The Board has renewed its commitment to its vital role in supporting the educational mission of Northeastern Illinois University. It is seeking opportunities to develop closer working relationships with the NEIU academic community.

After a thorough search, NEIU welcomed its sixth president, Dr. Sharon K. Hahs who assumed the presidency on February 1, 2007. In any institution, a change in leadership can bring new priorities, programs and management initiatives. Dr. Hahs has pledged her support to increase private contributions for NEIU and initiated a search for a new Vice President of Development for Marketing and Communications.

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1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Financial Reporting Entity

Northeastern Illinois University Foundation (the "Foundation") is an Illinois nonprofit corporation established in May 1969 to secure and manage private support to benefit Northeastern Illinois University (University), a State agency.

The Foundation is a "University Related Organization", as defined under the University Guidelines adopted by the Legislative Audit Commission in 1982, as amended in 1997, and a component unit of the State of Illinois for financial reporting purposes. Due to the significance of the financial relationship with the University, in accordance with Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 39, *Determining Whether Certain Organizations are Component Units*, an amendment to GASB Statement No. 14, the Foundation is also included as a component unit of the University for financial reporting purposes. The financial balances and activities included in these financial statements are therefore also included as part of the University's financial statements and the State of Illinois Comprehensive Annual Financial Report. All funds of the Foundation are locally administered and are neither subject to the State of Illinois appropriation process nor held in the State treasury.

Basis of presentation

These financial statements include all financial activities over which the Foundation exercises direct responsibility.

The financial statement presentation required by GASB Statement No.'s 35, 37 and 38 provides a comprehensive perspective of the Foundation's assets, liabilities, net assets, revenues, expenses, changes in net assets and cash flows.

For financial reporting purposes, the Foundation is considered a special-purpose government engaged only in business-type activities. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting using the economic resources measurement focus. Under the accrual basis, revenues are recognized when earned, and expenses are recorded when a liability has been incurred. All significant intra-agency transactions have been eliminated.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the Foundation's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as needed.

In accordance with Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 20, the Foundation is required to follow all applicable GASB pronouncements. In addition, the Foundation applies all applicable Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Statements and Interpretations, Accounting Principles Board (APB) Opinions and Accounting Research Bulletins of the Committee on Accounting Procedures issued on or before November 30, 1989 unless those pronouncements conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements. The Foundation elected not to apply FASB pronouncements issued after November 30, 1989.

The basic financial statements include prior year comparative information, which has been derived from the Foundation's 2006 financial statements. Such information does not include all of the information required to constitute a presentation in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the Foundation's financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2006.

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Reclassification

Gain on sale of donated stocks totaling \$1,075 which was originally included in the cash flows from operating activities under other operating receipts in the prior year financial statements was reclassified to contributions received for operating purposes in the current year financial statements.

Gift Revenues

Gifts of securities are recorded at fair value on the date of the gift. In accordance with the requirements of Governmental Accounting Standards Board ("GASB") Statement No. 31, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Certain Investments and for External Investment Pools, all investments are reported at fair value. Changes in unrealized gain (loss) are reported as a component of investment income in the Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Assets.

Gifts of property and equipment are stated at market values as of the date of the gift. Gifts of service are recorded as both revenue and expenses based on estimates of the fair market value of services received.

Property and equipment are stated at cost for purchased items. The Foundation does not hold any property that is subject to depreciation.

Operating Revenues

Revenues are classified as Operating Revenues if they have the characteristics of exchange transactions, such as contract revenue with the University. Typically, non-operating revenues include revenues that have the characteristics of non-exchange transactions as defined in GASB Statement No. 9, Reporting Cash Flows of Proprietary and Non-expendable Trust Funds and Governmental Entities That Use Proprietary Fund Accounting, and by GASB Statement No. 34 which would include gifts and investment income. Because securing gifts and investing funds constitute the Foundation's primary operations, gift revenues (other than endowments) and investment income have been classified as operating revenues.

Cash and cash equivalents

The Foundation considers highly liquid investments with original maturities of ninety days or less when purchased to be cash equivalents. At June 30, 2007, cash equivalents consisted primarily of money market and similar funds.

Investments

Investments purchased or received by gift are carried at market value. Investments are recorded at fair value, as determined by quoted market prices. Substantially all of the investments are managed by external professional investment managers. Many of these investments are made through commingled investment vehicles such as common trust funds and mutual funds. Board policy authorizes the Foundation to invest in domestic equity; domestic fixed income; international equity; international fixed income; real estate investment trusts; and private capital. At June 30, 2007, investments consisted of U.S. Government securities and mutual funds.

Tax-exempt status

The Foundation is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Net Assets of the Foundation are classified as follows:

Restricted Net Assets – Nonexpendable: Nonexpendable restricted net assets consist of endowment funds. Endowment funds include those funds where donors have stipulated, as a condition of the gift, that the principal is to be maintained inviolate and in perpetuity, and invested for the purpose of producing present and future income, which may either be expended or added to the principal.

Restricted Net Assets – Expendable: Expendable restricted net assets include resources in which the Foundation is legally or contractually obligated to spend in accordance with restrictions imposed by external parties.

Unrestricted Net Assets: Unrestricted net assets primarily represent resources used for transactions relating to the general operations of the Foundation, and may be used at the discretion of the Foundation's Board to meet current expenses for any purpose.

Included in the investments are funds restricted for GEAR UP scholarships totaling \$786,969.

Custodial Credit Risk

Custodial credit risk is the potential for a financial institution or counterparty to fail such that the Foundation would not be able to recover the value of deposits, investments or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. The Foundation's policy does not address custodial credit risk.

As of June 30, 2007, bank balance of \$200,416 held by the Foundation are insured or collateralized with securities held in the Foundation's name.

Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that an issuer or counterparty to a debt investment will not fulfill its obligations.

The Foundation's investment policy limits investments in corporate securities rated "Baa" or higher.

Credit quality ratings are not required for U.S. Government securities that are explicitly guaranteed by the U.S. government. The Foundation's mutual funds are invested in the following funds held by the Vanguard Group, Philadelphia, PA:

The Vanguard Balanced Index Fund has 60% of its assets in stocks and 40% in bonds. The dollar-weighted average credit quality of the Fund's holdings, as rated by Moody's Investors Service, Inc. was "Aa1", as of December 31, 2006.

The Vanguard International Value Fund is a value-oriented fund that invests primarily in the common stocks of foreign companies in a number of different countries throughout the world, without regard for the size (capitalization) of the companies.

Interest Rate Risk

As a means of limiting its exposure to fair value losses arising from rising interest rates, the Foundation's investment policy limits investments in fixed-income securities to no more than 40%. Interest rate risk is managed according to the purpose of the investments and the projected timeframe for the use of these assets.

The \$75,105 in U.S. Treasury obligations are held in book entry form at Focused Investments, and consist of a note with a maturity of August 15, 2007, and interest rate of 6.125%.

The Foundation's mutual funds portfolio invested in the Vanguard Balanced Index Fund and held by the Vanguard Group is managed to provide investment allocations, characteristics, and yields consistent with its benchmark, the Lehman Brothers Aggregate Bond Index, which measures a wide spectrum of public, investment-grade, taxable, fixed income securities in the United States – including government, corporate, and international dollar-denominated bonds, as well as mortgage-backed and asset-backed securities, all with maturities of more than one year. Interest rate risk is managed by structuring the average maturity and duration of the investments to the benchmark. The bond portion of this fund has an average maturity of 7.5 years.

Country/Regional Risk and Foreign Currency Risk

Country/Regional risk is the risk that domestic events – such as political upheaval, financial troubles, or natural disasters – will weaken a country's or region's securities markets. Foreign Currency risk is the risk that the value of a foreign investment, measured in U.S. dollars, will decrease because of unfavorable changes in currency exchange rates. The Foundations investment policy limits investments in an international portfolio to 10%. An international portfolio may contain equities issued by companies operating in emerging markets which should not represent more than 5% of all Foundation assets invested in equities.

The Foundation's investments in the Vanguard International Value Fund, consisting of investments in foreign countries, represent 10% of total Foundation investments and were distributed among the following currencies as of June 30, 2007:

3. NONCURRENT OTHER ASSETS

Noncurrent other assets include four Rolex watches and a sculpture which were donated to the Foundation.

4. NORTHEASTERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY AGREEMENT

On July 1, 2005, the Foundation entered into an agreement with Northeastern Illinois University. Under the terms of the contract, the Foundation aids and assists the University in developing facilities for broader educational opportunities for the service to its students, alumni, and citizens of the State of Illinois and of the United States by encouraging gifts of money, property, works of art, historical and other material having educational, artistic and historical value. In turn, the University will furnish certain services necessary to the operation of the Foundation. The contract maybe cancelled upon ninety days written notice by either party.

During fiscal year 2007, certain personal services and facilities of the University with an estimated value of \$91,296 were provided to the Foundation without charge. In turn, the Foundation provided the University with support in the amount of \$329,121.

During the fiscal year, the Foundation also received \$752,888 from the University to set-up a Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Program (GEAR UP) scholarship fund. As of June 30, 2007, no scholarships have been awarded, thus the funds received were recorded as deferred revenue. The funds were invested and restricted for use by the GEAR UP program.

5. ENDOWMENT FUNDS

If a donor has not provided specific instructions, state law permits the Northeastern Illinois University Foundation Board (the Board) to authorize for expenditure the net appreciation (realized and unrealized) of the investments of endowment funds. When administering its power to spend net appreciation, the Board is required to consider the Foundation's "long-and short-term needs, present and anticipated financial requirements, expected total return on its investments, price-level trends, and general economic conditions". Any net appreciation that is spent is required to be spent for the purposes for which the endowment was established.

It is the Foundation's policy to distribute annually 5% of a trailing three or five year average of the Endowment's total asset value, with the understanding that this spending rate plus inflation will not normally exceed total return from investment. However, it is understood that this total return basis for calculating spending is sanctioned by the Uniform Management of Institutional Funds Act (UMIFA), under which guidelines the University is permitted to spend an amount in excess of the current yield (interest and dividends earned), including realized or unrealized appreciation.

Independent Auditors' Report on Internal Control Over Financial Reporting and on Compliance and Other Matters Based on an Audit of Financial Statements Performed in Accordance With Government Auditing Standards

As Special Assistant Auditors for the Auditor General, we have audited the basic financial statements of the business-type activities of Northeastern Illinois University Foundation (Foundation), as of and for the year ended June 30, 2007, and have issued our report thereon dated October 26, 2007. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Foundation's internal control over financial reporting in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Foundation's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Foundation's internal control over financial reporting.

Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in the internal control over financial reporting that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. However, as discussed below, we identified a certain deficiency in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be a significant deficiency.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the entity's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the entity's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control. We consider the deficiency described in the accompanying schedule of finding to be a significant deficiency in internal control over financial reporting (07-1).

A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that results in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control.

Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in the internal control that might be significant deficiencies and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all significant deficiencies that are also considered to be material weaknesses. However, we consider item 07-01 to be a material weakness.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Foundation's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

We have conducted a State compliance examination of the Foundation as required by the Illinois State Auditing Act. The results of that examination will be reported to management under separate cover.

The Foundation's response to the finding identified in our audit is described in the accompanying schedule of finding. We did not audit the Foundation's response and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Auditor General, the General Assembly, the Legislative Audit Commission, the Governor, Board of Trustees, and Foundation's management, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

Current Finding – *Government Auditing Standards* **For the Year Ended June 30, 2007**

07-1. Failure to Apply Appropriate Accounting Principles

Northeastern Illinois University Foundation (Foundation) did not properly interpret and apply Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 33 *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Nonexchange Transactions.*

The Foundation received \$752,888 from Northeastern Illinois University (University) to set-up a Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Program (GEAR UP) scholarship. The amount represented unspent grant funds from the GEAR UP program that the University had obtained the approval from the U.S. Department of Education to change the scope from the original proposal to establish a scholarship component for this program.

The policy for the administration of the scholarship includes requirements for the eligibility of applicants, application process, requirement for the award, eligibility for renewal, renewal application process, the amounts and use of the scholarship funds, and the role of the Chicago GEAR UP Alliance (Alliance). The funds will be administered locally by the Alliance and awarded as scholarships to students who had participated in the GEAR UP program. The Foundation will hold and spend the funds as directed by the Alliance.

As of fiscal year-end, the funds were invested and restricted for use by this program and no scholarships have been awarded. However, we noted that the Foundation recorded the \$752,888 as other revenue, instead of deferred revenue. The Foundation subsequently revised the financial statements to include the adjustments necessary to apply the appropriate generally accepted accounting principles.

Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) for governmental entities is promulgated by GASB. GASB Statement No. 33 requires revenue recognition for voluntary nonexchange transactions when all applicable eligibility requirements have been met. Grant funds that are received prior to meeting eligibility requirements should be recorded as deferred revenue. Eligibility requirements are conditions specified by the grant that must be met, such as the eligible recipients, time requirements, matching requirements, etc.

According to the Foundation personnel, the above exception occurred due to the complexity of the GEAR UP grant requirements which were not fully known at the time of receipt of the grant.

Failure to apply the applicable generally accepted accounting principles may result in inaccurate financial statements. (Finding Code No. 07-1)

Recommendation

We recommend that the Foundation improve its procedures for identifying transactions that include special terms and properly account for such transactions in accordance with GAAP.

Foundation Response

The Northeastern Illinois University Foundation concurs with the finding as it relates to the receipt of the GEAR UP funds. Given the information available at the time, the Foundation representatives made the decision to record funds from the GEAR UP grant as other revenue, rather than deferred revenue. This misclassification was the result of the complexity of the GEAR UP grant, which includes requirements for the eligibility of applicants, application process, eligibility for renewal, and the amounts and use of the scholarship funds. We concur that the grant funds that were received prior to meeting eligibility requirements should have been recorded as deferred revenue.

We also would like to note that, after the auditors brought this issue to our attention, we submitted revised financial statements to include the adjustments necessary to apply the appropriate generally accepted accounting principles. Our annual financial statements as of and for the year ended June 30, 2007 are correctly stated. We will strengthen our procedures hence forward to ensure adherence to generally accepted accounting principles in the recording and reporting of all transactions.
