INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

As Special Assistant Auditors for the Auditor General, we have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2006, which collectively comprise the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31, as of June 30, 2006, and the respective changes in financial position and cash flows, where applicable, thereof for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued a report dated October 18, 2006 on our consideration of the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

The Management's Discussion and Analysis and Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund Schedule of Funding Progress on pages 27 to 33 and page 63 are not a required part of the basic financial statements but are supplementary information required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31's basic financial statements. The combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements, budgetary comparison schedules, and Schedule of Disbursements to School District Treasurers and Others are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. The accompanying Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by the U. S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations,* and is also not a required part of the basic financial statements of the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31. The combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements, budgetary comparison schedules, Schedule of Disbursements to School District Treasurers and Others, and the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards have been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING AND ON COMPLIANCE AND OTHER MATTERS BASED ON AN AUDIT OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PERFORMED IN ACCORDANCE WITH GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

As Special Assistant Auditors for the Auditor General, we have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2006, which collectively comprise the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31's basic financial statements and have issued our report thereon dated October 18, 2006. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31's internal control over financial reporting in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting. Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control over financial reporting that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements caused by error or fraud in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving internal control over financial reporting and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, we noted other matters involving internal control over financial reporting which we reported on the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs as items 06-2 and 06-3.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests

of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*. However, we noted a certain immaterial instance of noncompliance which we reported on the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs as item 06-1.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Auditor General, the General Assembly, the Legislative Audit Commission, the Governor, agency management, others within the organization, the Illinois State Board of Education, federal awarding agencies and pass-through entities and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

REPORT ON COMPLIANCE WITH REQUIREMENTS APPLICABLE TO EACH MAJOR PROGRAM AND ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER COMPLIANCE IN ACCORDANCE WITH OMB CIRCULAR A-133

Compliance

We have audited the compliance of the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 with the types of compliance requirements described in the *U.S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-133 Compliance Supplement* that are applicable to each of its major federal programs for the year ended June 30, 2006. The Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31's major federal programs are identified in the summary of auditor's results section of the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs. Compliance with the requirements of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants applicable to each of its major federal programs is the responsibility of the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31's compliance based on our audit.

We conducted our audit of compliance in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and OMB Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*. Those standards and OMB Circular A-133 require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether noncompliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on a major federal program occurred. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence about the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31's compliance with those requirements and performing such other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion. Our audit does not provide a legal determination of the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31's compliance with those requirements.

In our opinion, the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 complied, in all material respects, with the requirements referred to above that are applicable to each of its major federal programs for the year ended June 30, 2006.

Internal Control Over Compliance

The management of the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over compliance with the requirements of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants applicable to federal programs. In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31's internal control over compliance with requirements that could have a direct and material effect on a major federal program in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on compliance and to test and report on the internal control over compliance in accordance with OMB Circular A-133.

Our consideration of the internal control over compliance would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that noncompliance with applicable requirements of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants caused by error or fraud that would be material in relation to a major federal program being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control over compliance and its operations that we consider to be material weaknesses.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Auditor General, the General Assembly, the Legislative Audit Commission, the Governor, agency management, others within the organization, Illinois State Board of Education, federal awarding agencies and pass-through entities and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

Part II: Findings Related to the Financial Statements

FINDING NO. 06-1 - Controls Over Compliance with Laws and Regulations (Repeated from 2005 - Finding No. 05-1)

Criteria/Specific Requirements:

- A. The Illinois School Code 105 ILCS 5/3-14.11 states that the Regional Superintendent shall examine at least once each year all books, accounts, and vouchers of every school treasurer in his educational service region, and if he finds any irregularities in them, to report them at once, in writing, to the trustees in Class II county school units, to the respective school boards of those school districts which form a part of a Class II county school unit but which are not subject to the jurisdiction of the trustees of schools of any township in which any such district is located, or to the respective school boards of the district in Class I county school units whose duty it shall be to take immediately such action as the case demands. (This mandate has existed in its current form since at least 1953.)
- B. The Illinois School Code 105 ILCS 5/3-14.5 requires the Regional Superintendent to visit each public school in the county at least once a year, noting the methods of instruction, the branches taught, the text-books used, and the discipline, government and general condition of the schools. (This mandate has existed in its current form since at least 1953.)

Conditions:

- A. The Regional Office of Education No. 31 is not examining all books, accounts, and vouchers of every school treasurer in his educational service area at least once each year. Regional Office officials noted that they believe this mandate is outdated and that they are satisfying the intent of the statute by other reviews they undertake. For example, the Regional Superintendent has been examining school district financial statements on an annual basis.
- B. The Regional Office of Education No. 31 performs compliance inspections for each school district in his region annually but not each public school. While the Illinois Public School Accreditation Process Compliance Component document completed at these inspections includes many of the items delineated in 105 ILCS 5/3-14.5, it does not include a review of the methods of instruction and the textbooks used in the district.

Part II: Findings Related to the Financial Statements (Continued)

FINDING NO. 06-1 - Controls Over Compliance with Laws and Regulations (Repeated from 2005 - Finding No. 05-1) (Continued)

Effect:

The Regional Office of Education No. 31 did not comply with statutory requirements.

Causes:

- A. The Regional Office of Education No. 31's management stated that the procedures currently being performed are deemed sufficient to comply with this mandate and that this mandate is outdated.
- B. The Regional Superintendent stated that the periodic compliance visits completed at the school districts were sufficient to satisfy the statutory requirement. In addition, due to the magnitude of the task and the limited budget, the visit could not be performed for each public school in the district on an annual basis.

Recommendations:

- A. The Regional Office of Education No. 31 should comply with the requirements of 105 ILCS 5/3-14.11.
- B. The Regional Superintendent should visit each public school annually to review all items noted in the statute as required by 105 ILCS 5/3-14.5.

If the Regional Office believes that any of these statutory mandates are obsolete or otherwise unnecessary, then it should seek legislative action to revise the statutes accordingly.

Management's Responses:

A. The Illinois Association of Regional Superintendents of Schools and the Illinois State Board of Education have agreed to seek legislation to remove duplicative and/or obsolete sections of the Illinois School Code. Both parties agree that section 5/3-7 of the Illinois School Code is a more current, thorough, and comprehensive requirement concerning a public school district's financial transactions. As a result, the two parties working together will seek legislation to repeal section 5/3-14.11 of the Illinois School Code.

Part II: Findings Related to the Financial Statements (Continued)

FINDING NO. 06-1 - Controls Over Compliance with Laws and Regulations (Repeated from 2005 - Finding No. 05-1) (Continued)

Management's Responses (Continued):

B. The Illinois Association of Regional Superintendents of Schools and the Illinois State Board of Education have agreed to seek legislation to remove duplicative and/or obsolete sections of the Illinois School Code. Both parties agree that section 1.20 of the 23rd Illinois Administrative Code is a more current, thorough, and comprehensive requirement concerning visitation of public schools by the Regional Superintendent. As a result, the two parties working together will seek legislation to repeal section 5/3-14.5 of the Illinois School Code.

Part II: Findings Related to the Financial Statements (Continued)

FINDING NO. 06-2 - Inadequate Controls Over Disposal of Property and Equipment

Criteria/Specific Requirements:

The Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 Fixed Assets Inventory Management Policy states that when property or equipment is removed from inventory for any reason, the Asset Inventory Disposal form is to be filled out and signed by (1) the person requesting the disposal, (2) finance department, and (3) the Regional Superintendent.

In addition, sound internal controls require that disposals or transfers be formally documented and approved by authorized personnel before the disposition. Upon disposal/transfer of property and equipment, the fixed asset inventory records should be updated to reflect movement or deletion.

Condition:

The Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 did not have adequate controls over disposal of fixed assets.

- Proper forms were not used to document disposal or retirement of 24 equipment items.
- Capital Asset/Fixed Asset Disposal Forms were not signed or approved by the Regional Superintendent.
- Current fixed asset inventory records were not updated to reflect the disposal of two (2) equipment items.

Effect:

Inadequate documentation of deletions and adjustments of fixed asset records may result in unauthorized dispositions and differences not being investigated thoroughly. Loss of ROE property and equipment may not be detected timely or remain undetected without proper approval of disposals and an accurate property inventory listing. In addition, fixed assets are not reported accurately if the inventory list is not updated in a timely manner.

Part II: Findings Related to the Financial Statements (Continued)

FINDING NO. 06-2 - Inadequate Controls Over Disposal of Property and Equipment (Continued)

Cause:

The Regional Office converted to a new accounting system, which includes a new fixed assets inventory system. The staff-in-charge of updating the inventory list was waiting to update the list after obtaining the approval for the disposal of fixed assets.

Recommendation:

We recommend that disposals/transfers of property and equipment be approved by authorized personnel before the disposition and the disposal/transfer is formally documented. The fixed asset listing should be updated promptly to reflect accurate balances.

Management's Response:

The Regional Office of Education does have a system and forms in place for disposal of property and equipment. We acknowledge that the forms in question were not completely processed since the Regional Superintendent had not signed the form yet. Our plan to address this situation is as follows:

A. With the purchase of the new software system in place and a redesigned form to be used for the disposal of fixed assets and checks and balances put in place by the new Finance Director, this problem should not happen again. Also, in regards to the minimum amount needed for the item to be considered a fixed asset as per conversation with the Kane County ROE's IT Manager and the auditors, this will help to make sure all fixed assets that are in the new software system will be maintained properly.

Part II: Findings Related to the Basic Financial Statements (Continued)

FINDING NO. 06-3 - Improper Accounting of Transactions

Criteria/Specific Requirements:

Title 23 Illinois Administrative Code: Education and Cultural Resources, Chapter I, Section 525.160, Fiscal Procedures requires the Regional Superintendent of Schools in each Regional Office of Education to maintain accurate financial records in accordance with 23 Illinois Administrative Code 110 Program Accounting Manual and Regional Office of Education (ROE) Accounting Manual, as applicable. The Manual requires that the ROE accounting system be organized and operated on a fund basis. The transactions and balances of each fund and each source of funds are to be accounted for separately. Separate funds or separate source of fund codes are used to account for resources of a program or activity that are restricted to spending of a specified type or for a specified purpose.

Generally accepted accounting principles require that disbursements made as an advance be accounted for with no net asset effect and the advances monitored for collection.

Conditions:

The ROE did not properly record the following transactions:

- The ROE received \$564,165 in fiscal year 2006 for the Youth Home Education Program. Rather than recording the revenue in the Youth Home Education Fund as was done in previous years, the ROE recorded the revenue under the Regional Program Development Fund.
- The ROE purchased computer related items for school districts as an added service. We noted that purchases totaling \$23,747 were recorded as expenses upon purchase and payment to the vendors and as revenues in the Local Technology Fund upon billing and collection from the school districts instead of recognizing these purchases as advances (receivables).
- Purchases for school districts totaling \$62,100 paid from the Local Technology Fund were recorded as purchased services expenses. The reimbursements received for these purchases were recorded as a deduction of software expenses instead of a reduction of purchased services expenses.

The purchases made for school districts were approved by the Regional Superintendent. However, there are no written procedures to provide guidance for the processing and recording of these transactions.

Part II: Findings Related to the Basic Financial Statements (Continued)

FINDING NO. 06-3 - Improper Accounting of Transactions (Continued)

Effect:

Transactions are not being recorded in accordance with the Illinois Program Accounting Manual and ROE Accounting Manual. Financial reports prepared by the ROE require additional analysis in order to be comparable and consistent with reporting requirements and GAAP. Revenues for the Youth Home Education Fund and Regional Program Development Fund were understated and overstated, respectively, by \$564,165. Local Technology Fund revenues and expenses were overstated by \$23,747. Purchased services expenses and software expenses were overstated and understated, respectively, by \$62,100. Absence of written procedures covering purchases for school districts resulted in inconsistent processing and accounting of these transactions.

Cause:

The Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31's management stated that the Youth Home Education program had more than enough program funds to finance its current year's expenses and the fund balance in the Youth Home Education program can be used for general purposes. Instead of recording the revenues in the same fund as previous years, the revenues were recorded under the Regional Program Development Fund, which is part of the general fund accounts, in lieu of a fund transfer from the Youth Home Education fund. Computer-related purchases for the school districts were treated as separate transactions of purchase and billing and the deduction of software expenses instead of purchased services was an oversight.

Recommendation:

Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 should establish procedures to ensure that transactions are carefully reviewed for proper accounting and recognition as required by generally accepted accounting principles, the Illinois Administrative Code and the ROE Accounting Manual.

Specifically, the ROE should ensure that revenues are recorded under the program or activity that generated the revenues. Operating transfers should be made and recorded if the ROE deems it necessary to reallocate the remaining funds that can be used for general purposes to other programs/funds. This would enable the ROE to review the net operating results of each of its programs accurately.

Part II: Findings Related to the Basic Financial Statements (Continued)

FINDING NO. 06-3 - Improper Accounting of Transactions (Continued)

Recommendation (Continued):

The ROE should develop formal policies and procedures covering purchases for school districts. At a minimum, these policies and procedures should include:

- Documentation of the justification for the on behalf purchase;
- Billing and collection of the purchase; and
- Accounting for the purchase and monitoring of the receivables.

Accounting for these purchases should be recorded as a receivable from the school districts and not as revenues and expenses. In this way, the receivables are recorded and can be easily tracked.

Management's Response:

We understand and agree that the findings are a result of coding and processing error. The revenue for the Youth Home account should have been deposited in to that account and then excess funds could be transferred to the Regional Program Development. The following safeguards and improvements have been addressed to ameliorate these situations:

A. Youth Home Education Program

In FY 2006, an entry was made by the former Finance Director in which money was deposited and recorded in the Regional Program Development Fund instead of the Youth Home Education Program. On July 1, 2006, a new finance system was installed. This system has added controls and features which will aid against having this type of error in the future. Our previous system did not have the ability to have multiple people notified and approve financial entries. Thus the previous Finance Director entered this incorrectly and in the future, based upon the agreement between District 303, the Chief Judge of Kane County, and the Regional Office of Education, the funds will be put into the Youth Home Program Fund and then at the end of the year, any excess funds will be transferred to the Regional Program Development Fund.

B. Invoicing Issue

The Kane County ROE, on behalf of four school districts, purchases the software support license allowing each district to save up to 15% each year. To process this, a vendor invoices Kane County ROE which then invoices each district for their appropriate costs.

FINDING NO. 06-3 - Improper Accounting of Transactions (Continued)

Management's Response (Continued):

The money received from the districts matches the amount invoiced by the vendor to the ROE. The coding error was a misunderstanding between the manager preparing the requisition and the Finance Department entering it into the finance system. In accordance with the Illinois Administrative Code Title 23 Section 110.50 on expenditure accounting and with the installation of the new finance system on July 1, 2006, this type of coding error should not occur because it is done electronically rather than from a paper description, with various levels of approvals.

C. Recording Issue

In regards to this finding, the Kane County ROE was cited for recording purchases as expenses upon purchase and payment to the vendors and as revenues in the Local Technology Fund upon billing and collection from the school districts instead of recognizing these purchases as advances (receivables). The new Kane County ROE Finance Director and the Regional Superintendent have reviewed this finding and agree with it. The ROE purchased a software license agreement on behalf of seven districts. Each district paid \$2 per user and the ROE paid the remainder of about \$62,000. The coding error was a misunderstanding between the manager preparing the requisition and the Finance Department entering it into the finance system. In accordance with Title 23 Section 110.50 subsection 11 of the Illinois Administrative Code and with the installation of the new finance system on July 1, 2006, this type of coding error should not occur because it is done electronically rather than from a paper description, with various levels of approval.

Conditions:

- A. The Regional Office of Education No. 31 is not examining all books, accounts, and vouchers of every school treasurer in his educational service area at least once each year. Regional Office officials noted that they believe this mandate is outdated and that they are satisfying the intent of the statute by other reviews they undertake. For example, the Regional Superintendent has been examining school district financial statements on an annual basis.
- B. The Regional Office of Education No. 31 performs compliance inspections for each school district in his region annually but not each public school. While the Illinois Public School Accreditation Process Compliance Component document completed at these inspections includes many of the items delineated in 105 ILCS 5/3-14.5, it does not include a review of the methods of instruction and the textbooks used in the district.

Plans:

- A. The Illinois Association of Regional Superintendents of Schools and the Illinois State Board of Education will seek legislation to repeal section 5/3-14.11 of the Illinois School Code.
- B. The Illinois Association of Regional Superintendents of Schools and the Illinois State Board of Education will seek legislation to repeal section 5/3-14.5 of the Illinois School Code.

- Current fixed asset inventory records were not updated to reflect the disposal of two (2) equipment items.

Plan:

With the purchase of the new software system in place and a redesigned form to be used for the disposal of fixed assets and checks and balances put in place by the new Finance Director, this problem should not happen again. Also, in regards to the minimum amount needed for the item to be considered a fixed asset as per conversation with the Kane County ROE's IT Manager and the auditors, this will help to make sure all fixed assets that are in the new software system will be maintained properly.

This discussion and analysis of the Kane County Regional Office of Education's financial report provides an overview of the financial activities for the year ended June 30, 2006 with comparative information for the year ended June 30, 2005. The intent of this discussion and analysis is to look at the ROE's performance as a whole. Readers should review the financial statements and any notes to the basic financial statements to assist them in understanding the role of the ROE, its operations and financial condition.

The purpose of the Kane County Regional Office of Education is to promote quality education for the citizens of the Kane County Educational Service Region by acting as an advocate for education, providing leadership, performing regulatory functions as directed by the Illinois State Board of Education and the Illinois School Code, providing access to needed resources and disseminating information to school districts, educators and the community.

Mission

The mission of the Kane County Regional Office of Education is to provide leadership in the learning community by developing educational resources, facilitating learning and collaborating with all educational partners.

Education Service Region

The Kane County Regional Office of Education serves over 125,000 students, which includes 114,344 public school students and 11,000 private/parochial students. Our region includes nine (K-12) unit districts, two community college districts, 160 public school buildings and over 9,000 public/private school teachers.

Overview/Issues

Again, there were some programs that were required under the Illinois School Code that did not receive continued funding or were reduced for this fiscal year. Although legislation was enacted to make some of these programs optional, the expectation from our constituents is that we continue and even expand the programs. The need does not go away for programs such as the Illinois Administrator's Academy and Gifted Education. A major funding source for Professional Development comes from the ROE/ISC budget which flows through the Illinois State Board of Education budget. Our ROE school services budget continued to be reduced since the last fiscal year with the expectation that we maintain or expand services to our school districts. The need to build and maintain an enterprise fund so that ROEs can provide needed services to our schools and personnel in the future, without relying on total State support is critical. In addition, as funding at the County level gets more competitive and there are less funds to distribute locally, County Boards are looking to the ROE to set aside funds from the various grants received to contribute to such items as rent, utilities, building maintenance and other items, which previously had been provided by the County.

We will again be allocating funds next fiscal year to these items and to an upcoming move of our Office to a new facility where we haven't been asked to contribute in past years. We continue to show student growth in our area and to have several new schools built every year in our region. Our overall budget for next year will reflect some deduction in new line items and maintenance of present programs at this year's level. We will continue to aggressively pursue new grants and opportunities to be able to expand the services provided by our Office and to provide funding and resources for our local school districts.

2006 Financial Highlights

- Within the Governmental Funds, the General Fund revenues decreased by \$135,302 (19%) from \$697,677 in FY 2005 to \$562,375 in FY 2006. General Fund expenditures increased by \$1,404,054 (234%) from \$599,944 in FY 2005 to \$2,003,998 in FY 2006.
- Within the Governmental Funds, the Special Fund revenue increased by \$719,405 (19%) from \$3,882,374 in FY 2005 to \$4,601,779 in FY 2006. The Special Fund expenditures decreased by \$79,706 (2%) from \$3,962,410 in FY 2005 to \$3,882,704 in FY 2006.
- The Enterprise Fund revenue increased by \$154,901 (52%) from \$297,194 in FY 2005 to \$452,095 in FY 2006. The Enterprise Fund expenditures increased by \$493,855 (169%) from \$292,184 in FY 2005 to \$786,039 in FY 2006.

The funds that comprise the budget for the Kane County ROE are derived from various sources of revenue. About 90% of the funds to operate and maintain services come from State and Federal grants that are on a July 1 - June 30 fiscal year. The remaining 10% of the operating budget is obtained from the County of Kane. This does not include the County's contribution of facilities, utilities, high-speed internet access and other miscellaneous/salary costs. The County is on a December 1 - November 30 fiscal year.

The major revenues received from State and Federal sources were the following: Regional Safe Schools Initiative - \$892,317; Truancy and Optional Education - \$319,283; Reading First - \$189,701; Title I - School Improvement & Accountability - \$910,894; McKinney Homeless grant - \$577,651; and Youth Home Education - \$970,846.

Using This Report

This report consists of a series of financial statements and other information, as follows:

- *Management's Discussion and Analysis* introduces financial statements and provides an analytical overview of the Regional Office's financial activities.
- The *Government-wide financial statements* consist of a Statement of Net Assets and a Statement of Activities. These provide information about the activities of the Regional Office of Education as a whole and present an overall view of the Office's finances.

- Fund financial statements report the Regional Office's operations in more detail than the government-wide statements by providing information about the most significant funds.
- Notes to the financial statements provide additional information that is needed for a full understanding of the data provided in the basic financial statements.
- Required supplementary information further explains the financial statements and supplementary information provides detailed information about the non-major funds.

The Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Activities

Government-wide Financial Statements

The Government-wide statements report information about the Regional Office of Education No. 31 as a whole. The Statement of Net Assets includes all of the assets and liabilities, with the difference reported as *net assets*. All of the current year revenues and expenses are accounted for in the Statement of Activities regardless of when cash is received or paid using Generally Accepted Accounting Principles and GASB Statement No. 34.

The Government-wide statements report the Office's net assets and how they have changed. Net assets- the difference between assets and liabilities- are one way to measure the ROE's financial condition.

- Over time, increases or decreases in the net assets can be an indicator of whether financial position is improving or deteriorating, respectively.
- To assess the Regional Office's overall financial condition, additional non-financial factors, such as new laws, rules, regulations, and actions by officials at the state level need to be considered.

Fund Financial Statements

The fund financial statements provide detailed information about the Regional Office's funds. Funds are accounting devices that allow the tracking of specific sources of funding and spending on particular programs. Some funds are required by state law. The Regional Office of Education No. 31 established other funds to control and manage money for particular purposes.

The Office has three kinds of funds:

Governmental Funds account for those funds through which most governmental functions
of the Region are financed. These focus on how cash and other financial assets that can
be readily converted to cash flow in and out and the balances left at the year-end that are
available for spending. Consequently, the governmental fund statements provide a
detailed short-term view that helps determine whether there are more or fewer resources

that can be spent in the near future to finance the Office's programs. The Office's Governmental Funds include: the General Fund and the Special Revenue Fund. The governmental funds required financial statements include a Balance Sheet and a Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances.

- Proprietary Funds account for resources from fees charged directly to those entities or
 individuals that use its services. Proprietary fund statements provide both long-term and
 short-term financial information consistent with the focus provided by government-wide
 financial statements but with more detail for major and non-major enterprise funds. The
 proprietary funds required financial statements include a Statement of Net Assets,
 Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Fund Net Assets and a Statement of
 Cash Flows.
- Fiduciary Funds are used to account for assets held by the Regional Office of Education No. 31 in a trust capacity or as an agent for individuals and private or governmental organizations. These funds are custodial in nature (assets equal liabilities) and do not involve measurement of results of operations. The fiduciary funds required financial statements include a Statement of Fiduciary Net Assets.

Government-Wide Financial Analysis

As noted earlier, net assets may serve when examined over time as one indicator of the financial position of the Regional Office. The net assets at the end of FY 2006 and FY 2005 totaled \$2,447,138 and \$3,488,935, respectively. The analysis that follows provides a summary of the Office's net assets as of June 30.

The Regional Office of Education's net assets decreased by \$1,041,797 (30%) from FY 2005. The decrease occurred in both Governmental and Proprietary Funds. In addition, net assets related to the Teacher Institute Fund are considered restricted for teacher professional development.

Governmental Activities

Revenues for governmental activities were \$5,164,154 and expenses were \$5,872,007. The increase in General Fund expenditures is mainly due to the increase in Regional Program Development expenses for the Youth Home Education program. Consequently, operating

transfers were made from the Youth Home Education Fund. Some grants increased while others decreased or were not funded in FY 2006. Title I - School Improvement and Accountability increased by \$379,426 due to having more schools on the academic watch list and the need to provide services to these schools. McKinney Education for Homeless grant increased by \$239,317 due to the increase in the number of students in the program. Title V - Innovative Programs - SEA Projects, Technology - Enhancing Education - Competitive and Title IV - Community Service grants were closed out, thus revenues decreased by \$631,232. In addition, the increase in Institute Fund revenues is attributed to the increase in teacher certification. Expenses were proportionally increased or decreased to meet the funding level.

Business-Type Activities

Revenues for business-type activities were \$452,095 and expenditures were \$786,039. The increase in revenues and expenditures is attributed to the increase in Technology workshops as well as the increase in background investigations conducted in FY 2006.

Financial Analysis of the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 Funds

As previously noted, the Regional Office of Education No. 31 uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. The ROE's Governmental Funds reported combined fund balances were \$1,829,007.

Governmental Fund Highlights

- The Illinois State Board of Education line item was not increased to support for school services.
- County support for the Regional Office of Education No. 31 remained at level funding.
- There was an increase in the state aid foundation level to \$5,334 per student from \$4,964. This helped to off-set the reduction in the grant dollars provided for the Safe Schools Program.

Proprietary Fund Highlights

Total proprietary fund net assets decreased by \$254,851 (41%). This is attributed to the increase in purchased services and payments to other governments related to Technology and other local workshops.

Fiduciary Fund Highlights

There was a decrease of \$17,996 (18%) in total fiduciary funds for FY 2006. Transactions during FY 2006 represent mainly transfers in and out of funds for the Distributive Fund.

KANE COUNTY REGIONAL OFFICE OF EDUCATION NO. 31 MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS JUNE 30, 2006

Budgetary Highlights

The Regional Office of Education No. 31 annually prepares budgets for several funds which serve as a guideline for activities and expenditures. The Regional Superintendent annually prepares an Office Operations Budget and submits it to the County Board for their approval. The Office Operations Budget covers a fiscal year which runs from December 1 to November 30. All grant budgets are prepared by the Regional Office of Education No. 31 and submitted to the granting agency for approval. Amendments must be submitted under guidelines established by the granting agency. Additionally, all Regional Office of Education funds are reported and included in our annual report. In addition, the Institute Fund is printed in a newspaper of general circulation in Kane County.

Capital Assets

Regional Office of Education No. 31's capital assets include office equipment, computers, audio-visual equipment, and office furniture. The Regional Office of Education No. 31 maintains an inventory of capital assets which have been accumulated over time. For FY 2006, total additions amounted to \$132,116 and there were no retirements. Depreciation expense for FY 2006 was \$113,955.

Economic Factors and Next Years' Budget

At the time these financial statements were prepared and audited, the Regional Office was aware of several existing circumstances that could affect its financial health in the future:

- The state aid foundation level has increased to \$5,334 per student.
- The interest rate on investments remains low and will impact interest earned.
- Most grants have remained near or at previous levels.
- County Board support for Regional Office of Education No. 31 will remain level.

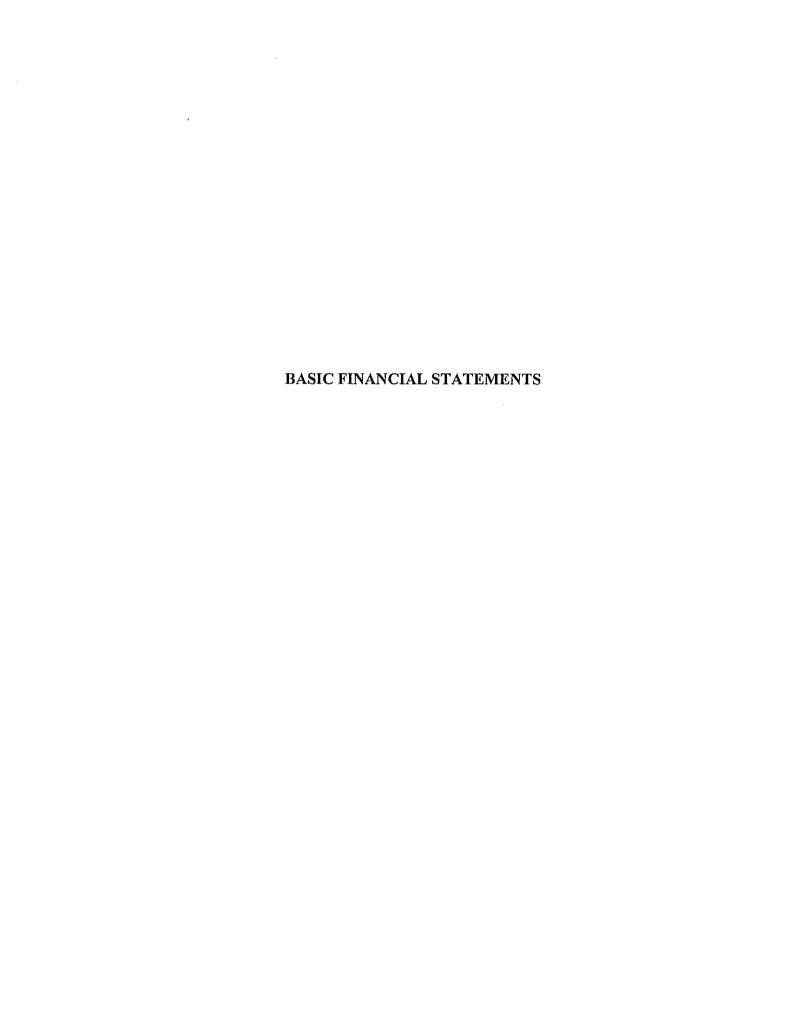

NOTE 1 - SUMMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A. Reporting Entity

Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 operates under the School Code (Articles 3 and 3A of <u>Illinois Compiled Statutes</u>, Chapter 105). The Regional Superintendent of Schools (Superintendent) serves as chief administrative officer of the Regional Office of Education No. 31 and is elected to the position for a four year term pursuant to Article 3 of <u>Illinois Compiled Statutes</u>, Chapter 105. The principal financial duty of the Superintendent is to receive and distribute monies due to school districts from general state aid, state categorical grants, and various other sources.

The superintendent's responsibilities for administering the school educational service region programs include, but are not limited to, providing directions to teachers and school officials on science, art and teaching methods; implementing the State Board of Education's Policy Programs; encouraging camaraderie among teachers' institute; making public notice of unfilled teaching positions within the region; and ensuring of the safety, health and welfare of the students in the region by periodically inspecting the school buildings and ensuring that the bus drivers have valid driving licenses and are properly trained to operate the school buses.

These are the only activities considered to be part of (controlled by or dependent on) the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31, as determined by the application of the criteria set forth in Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 14, The Financial Reporting Entity. The criteria for inclusion of an entity include, but are not limited to, legal standing, fiscal dependency, imposition of will and potential for financial benefit or burden.

Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 has determined that no other outside agency meets any of the above criteria and, therefore, no other agency has been included as a component unit in the financial statements. Furthermore, the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 does not consider itself to be a component unit of any other entity.

B. Government-wide and Fund Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements (i.e., the Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Activities) report information on all of the nonfiduciary activities of the primary government. For the most part, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements. The statements distinguish between those activities of the ROE that are governmental in nature and those that are considered business-type activities. Governmental activities normally are supported by operating grants and contributions,

charges for services and intergovernmental revenues. *Business-type activities* normally are supported by amounts assessed or received from local sources for the ROE programs.

The Statement of Activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segment are offset by program revenues. *Direct expenses* are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. *Program revenues* include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function or segment, and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as *general revenues*. Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements.

C. New Accounting Pronouncements

Effective July 1, 2005, the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 adopted the following accounting pronouncements:

- GASB Statement No. 42, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Impairment of Capital Assets and for Insurance Recoveries, which establishes standards for impairment of capital assets and clarifies and establishes accounting requirements for insurance recoveries.
- GASB Statement No. 44, Economic Condition Reporting: The Statistical Section, an amendment of NCGA Statement 1, which amends the portions of NCGA Statement 1, Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting Principles, that guide the preparation of the statistical section.
- GASB Statement No. 46, Net Assets Restricted by Enabling Legislation (an amendment of GASB Statement No. 34), which clarifies the definition of legal enforceability as it relates to net assets restricted by enabling legislation and requires disclosure of the amount of net assets restricted by enabling legislation.
- GASB Statement No. 47, Accounting for Termination Benefits, which establishes accounting and financial reporting standards for termination benefits.

There was no significant impact on the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31's financial statements as a result of adopting the above statements.

D. Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting, and Financial Statement Presentation

The financial statements of Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 are prepared in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). The Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 applies all applicable GASB pronouncements as well as the following pronouncements issued on or before November 30, 1989, unless these pronouncements conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements: Financial Accounting Standards Board Statements and Interpretations, Accounting Principles Board Opinions, and Accounting Research Bulletins of the Committee on Accounting Procedure.

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Proprietary fund financial statements also report using this same focus and basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Governmental fund and fiduciary financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized when susceptible to accrual; i.e. when they become both measurable and available. "Measurable" means the amount of the transaction can be determined and "available" means collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current period. Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 considers revenues as available if they are collected within 60 days after year end. Expenditures are recorded when the related fund liability is incurred. In applying the susceptible to accrual concept to intergovernmental revenues, the legal and contractual requirements of the numerous individual programs are used as guidance.

There are, however, essentially two types of these revenues. In one, monies must be expended on the specific purpose or project before any amounts will be paid; therefore, revenues are recognized based upon the expenditures recorded. In the other, monies are virtually unrestricted as to purpose of expenditure and are usually revocable only for failure to comply with prescribed compliance requirements. These resources are reflected as revenues at the time of receipt or earlier if the susceptible to accrual criteria are met.

Private-sector standards of accounting and financial reporting issued prior to December 1, 1989, generally are followed in the government-wide financial statements to the extent that those standards do not conflict with or contradict the guidance of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the ROE's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

E. Fund Accounting

The accounts of the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 are organized on the basis of funds, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund balance, revenue, and expenditures. The resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The various funds are summarized by type in the basic financial statements. The following summarizes the fund types used:

Governmental Fund Types

Governmental Funds are those through which most governmental functions are financed. The acquisition, use and balances of the expendable financial resources and the related current liabilities are accounted for through governmental funds.

<u>General Fund</u> - Accounts for resources traditionally associated with government which are not required, legally or by sound financial management, to be accounted for in another fund. The general fund is reported as a major governmental fund in the financial statements. The following are included in the general funds:

<u>ROE/ISC Operations</u> - Accounts for grant monies received for, and payment of, assisting schools in all areas of school improvement.

<u>Regional Program Development</u> - This program provides for the general improvement and expansion of education within Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 including the educational program for the students at the Juvenile Justice Center (Youth Home Education).

<u>Learning Technology Center</u> - Accounts for resources and payments of expenditures for Learning Technology HUB program for the purpose of providing a coordinated, statewide support infrastructure which assists school districts in planning for, implementing, assessing results and educating school staff in the use of technology and telecommunications in curricular, instructional and administrative functions.

Special Revenue Funds - Accounts for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than those accounted for in the Fiduciary Funds) that are legally restricted to

expenditures for specified purposes. The Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 reported the following special revenue funds as major governmental funds.

<u>Institute Fund</u> - Accounts for fees collected for the registration and renewal of teaching certificates. These fees are used to defray administrative expenses incidental to teachers' institutes, workshops or meetings of a professional nature that are designed to promote the professional growth of teachers or for the purpose of defraying the expense of any general or special meeting of teachers or school personnel, which has been approved by the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31. All funds generated remain restricted until expended only on the aforementioned activities.

<u>Education Fund</u> - Accounts for state and federal grant monies received for, and payment of, expenditures incurred in administering numerous grant awards which include:

<u>ROE/ISC Technology</u> - Program designed to support learning technology services to the local school districts.

Federal Special Education - IDEA Flow-Through - Funds used to enhance the capacity of schools to safely and effectively educate all students by applying research-based behavior support systems that maximize academic achievement of student and teacher outcomes.

<u>Regional Safe Schools</u> - This fund is an alternative schooling program for disruptive youth, creating alternative placement for those students who are suspended and/or are deemed ineligible.

<u>General State Aid</u> - Accounts for grant monies received for, and payment of expenditures for regional learning academy supplements.

<u>Truants' Alternative and Optional Education Program (TAP)</u> - Accounts for resources and payment of expenditures to provide support service and evaluate compliance with recommendations to Kane and DeKalb County truants and their parents. TAP was established under a grant from the State of Illinois.

<u>Career Awareness and Development Program</u> - Funds provide career awareness and development training opportunities for elementary and middle school educators to integrate information on career and career planning into context of the fundamental learning areas.

<u>SOS - Q4 Teacher Quality</u> - System of Support, Quadrant Four is a State coordination and services grant for improving teacher quality through professional development. Funds were received by the Professional Development Alliance and provided to Regional System of Support Providers (RESPROs).

<u>Title II - Teacher Quality Leadership</u> - Accounts for grant monies received for, and payment of, expenditures incurred in providing workshops to teachers for improvement of instruction in the classroom.

FY 04/FY 05/FY 06 Title I - Reading First Part B SEA Funds / Reading First Coordinator / Reading First Technical Assistant - Funds provide assistance to school districts in establishing reading programs for students in kindergarten through third grade that are based on scientifically based reading research. Reading first also focuses on teacher development and ensuring that all teachers, including special education teachers, have the tools they need to effectively help their students learn to read.

<u>Title I - School Improvement & Accountability</u> - Accounts for federal monies received for, and payment of, expenditures of the Title I - Accountability grant. This grant provides school districts with funds to carry out their school improvement and corrective action responsibilities under Section 1116(c) of Title I while offering students in schools identified for improvement and corrective action the opportunity to transfer to another higher performing public school, including a public charter within the district.

McKinney Education for Homeless Children - Accounts for grant monies received for and payment of, expenditures associated with a Federal program designed to provide counseling and educational support to homeless children and their families. The programs are funded by a Federal Stewart B. McKinney Education for Homeless Children and Youth Grant administered through the Illinois State Board of Education.

<u>Technology - Enhancing Education - Competitive - Funds provide</u> coordinated support and infrastructure which assists school districts in planning for, implementing, assessing results and educating school staff in the use of technology and telecommunications in curricular, instructional and administrative functions.

<u>Title IV - Community Service</u> - Accounts for monies received for, and payment of expenditures for Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities

Programs. These programs enhance the Nation's efforts to prevent illegal use of drugs and violence among, and promote safety and discipline for, students at all levels in the community.

<u>Youth Home Education</u> - Funds are used to provide an educational program for the students at the Juvenile Justice Center.

<u>Standards Aligned Classroom</u> - Funds are used to offer additional opportunities for teachers and administrators to gain knowledge and skills in aligning classroom level curriculum and assessment to the Illinois Learning Standards.

Nonmajor Special Revenue Funds - The Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 reported the following special revenue funds as non-major governmental funds.

<u>General Education Development (GED)</u> - Accounts for the revenues and expenditures associated with the processing of applications for the high school level test of General Education Development and the issuance of diplomas upon the successful completion of the examination.

Bus Driver Training - Accounts for the revenues received from individuals and contractors to sponsor instructional training courses for school bus drivers.

<u>Supervisory</u> - Accounts for travel and other expenditures necessary to perform the duty of supervising the school districts in Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31. This fund includes the balance of the Payroll Clearing Fund.

<u>Local Truancy</u> - Accounts for revenues received from local sources to address the truancy problem in Kane County.

Proprietary Fund Types

<u>Enterprise Funds</u> - to account for resources from fees charged directly to those entities or individuals that use its services.

Education Service Center (ESC) Professional Development Local 2 - This fund was created to maintain control of all revenues and expenses from workshops conducted by Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31. The ROE reported this fund as a major enterprise fund.

<u>Nonmajor Proprietary Funds</u> - the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 reported the following proprietary funds as non-major funds:

<u>Visual Media Cooperative</u> - Accounts for funds received and disbursed by the Superintendent as administrative agent for the Kane County Visual Media Cooperative. The Visual Media Cooperative is a cooperative of school districts, which maintains a library of educational films. New and replacement films and videos are financed from rental charges to users.

<u>Business Partners Initiative</u> - The Business Partners Initiative currently involves a partnership with Dukane Corporation of St. Charles, Illinois to provide overhead projectors, LCD projectors and various other multimedia products to schools throughout Illinois at a cost significantly below retail price.

<u>Technology</u> - A collaboration between the Northeastern Illinois Regional Offices of Education to provide computer workshops for the teachers of Northern Illinois. This fund is locally funded by Area 1, which is made of the Northeastern Illinois Regional Offices of Education.

<u>Local Counselors Academy</u> - Accounts for local revenues and disbursements related to Counselors Academy Program.

<u>Criminal Background Investigation</u> - Accounts for the assessments received from the school districts to pay for the processing of fingerprinting the substitute teachers and expenditures incurred providing this service to the school districts.

<u>Kane County Human Resources Consortium</u> - Used to account for monies received for, and partial payment of, expenditures for the Kane County Human Resources Consortium program.

Fiduciary Fund Types

Fiduciary Funds are used to account for assets held in a trustee capacity or as an agent for individuals or private or governmental organizations. The Fiduciary Funds include the following:

Agency Funds - The Agency Funds are used to account for assets held as an agent for individuals, private organizations, other governmental units and/or other funds. Agency Funds are custodial in nature (assets equal liabilities) and do not involve measurement of operations. The Agency Funds include the following:

<u>Payroll</u> - Accounts for all payroll that is incurred. Any fund that has payroll remits the money to the Payroll Fund, the Fund then pays the employee. This is an administrative agent for the ROE's payroll.

<u>Juvenile Drug Court</u> - The ROE provides fiscal support to the Sixteenth Judicial Circuit for a program to assist juvenile drug offenders in DeKalb, Kane and Kendall Counties. The program is funded by a grant from the City of Aurora.

<u>Distributive Fund</u> - The Distributive Fund accounts for state and federal revenues and assets held by Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 as an agent for the school districts within the jurisdiction. These funds are custodial in nature and do not involve measurement of the results of operations. The amounts due to the school districts are equal to the assets.

F. Revenues - Exchange and Non-exchange Transactions

Revenue resulting from exchange transactions, in which each party gives and receives essentially equal value, is recorded on the accrual basis when the exchange takes place. On a modified accrual basis, revenue is recorded in the fiscal year in which the resources are measurable and become available.

Non-exchange transactions, in which the ROE receives value without directly giving value in return, includes grants and donations. On an accrual basis, revenue from grants and donations is recognized in the fiscal year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied. Eligibility requirements include timing requirements, which specify the year when the resources are required to be used or the fiscal year when use is first permitted, matching requirements, in which the ROE must provide local resources to be used for specific purpose, and expenditure requirements, in which the resources are provided to the ROE on a reimbursement basis. On a modified accrual basis, revenue from non-exchange transactions must be available before it can be recognized.

G. Cash and Cash Equivalents

For presentation in the financial statements, investments with an original maturity of three months or less at the time they are purchased by the ROE are considered to be cash equivalents. Investments with an original maturity of more than three months are reported as investments.

H. Capital Assets

Capital assets result from expenditures in the governmental funds. These assets are reported in the governmental activities column of the government-wide Statement of Net Assets but are not reported in the fund financial statements.

Capital assets are recorded at cost at time of acquisition or fair value at the date of donation. The ROE capitalizes items costing \$500 or more. Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives (five to seven years) of the respective assets.

I. Deferred Revenues

The ROE reports unearned deferred revenue in the governmental fund Balance Sheet. Deferred and unearned revenue arises when potential revenue does not meet both the measurable and available criteria for recognition in the current period.

J. Net Assets

Net assets present the difference between assets and liabilities in the Statement of Net Assets. Net assets of the ROE are classified as follows:

Invested in Capital Assets - represents the ROE's total investment in capital assets. There is no outstanding debt related to these assets at this time.

Restricted Net Assets - represent resources in which the ROE is legally obligated to spend in accordance with restrictions imposed by enabling legislation.

Unrestricted Net Assets - represent resources used for transactions relating to the general operations of the ROE and may be used at the discretion of management to meet expenses for any purpose.

K. Management Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

L. Budgets and Budgetary Accounting

Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 did not formally adopt a budget for the year ended June 30, 2006 and is not legally required to do so. The Illinois State Board of Education requires budgets for certain State and Federal programs. These budgets were used to prepare the Budgetary Comparison Schedules for the following programs:

M. Revenue from Federal and State Grants

Revenues from federal and State grant awards are recorded net of the amount due to the State for the unused portion of the grant or the amount carried over to the following fiscal year project. Amounts due to the State or carried over to the following year project are recorded as liabilities.

NOTE 2 - CASH AND INVESTMENTS

<u>Deposits</u>

The Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 utilizes several different bank accounts for its various activities. The book balance of such accounts is \$2,371,093 at June 30, 2006, while the bank balance was \$3,275,905. The difference between the above amounts primarily represents checks that have been issued but have not yet cleared the bank as of June 30, 2006.

Custodial credit risk for deposits exists when, in the event of the failure of a depository financial institution, the ROE's deposits may not be recovered. Originally, GASB Statement No. 3 discussed three categories of custodial credit risk as follows:

Category 1 includes deposits covered by depository insurance or collateral held by Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 in its name.

Category 2 includes deposits covered by collateral held by the financial institutions in a pledged safekeeping account in the name of Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31.

Category 3 includes deposits which are uncollateralized or the collateral is held by the financial institution trust department but not in the name of Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31.

The ROE's deposits are covered by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) and by collateral held by the financial institution in the ROE's name. Although deposit balances classified under the traditional risk categories of 1 and 2 have been determined under GASB Statement No. 40 to be exposed to only minimal risk, and, based on this conclusion, the GASB chose to limit disclosure of custodial credit risk to deposits that meet the definition of "Category 3", the ROE has decided to include categories 1 and 2 in the discussion. The following table reflects the ROE's level of risk as of June 30, 2006:

The exempt funds are those deposited into the Illinois Funds.

Investments

The ROE's established investment policy follows the State of Illinois Public Funds Investment Act which authorizes the ROE to purchase certain obligations of the U.S. Treasury, federal agencies and instrumentalities; certificates of deposit and time deposits covered by Federal depository insurance; commercial paper of U.S. corporations with assets exceeding \$500,000,000, if such paper is rated at the highest classification established by at least two standard rating services; money market funds and the Illinois Funds.

The ROE has pooled its investments. Investments are stated at fair value. Net income from investments of pooled funds is allocated and credited to the original sources of the funds. As of June 30, 2006, the ROE's investments are certificate of deposits totaling \$502,054.

Interest Rate Risk is the risk that changes in interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment. Generally, the longer the maturity of an investment, the greater the sensitivity of its fair value to changes in market interest rates. The ROE's policy for reducing its exposure to the risk is to structure the ROE's portfolio so that securities mature to meet the ROE's cash requirements for ongoing operations. As of June 30, 2006, all the investments have investment maturities of six to eighteen months.

Credit Risk is the risk that an issuer or other counterparty to an investment will not fulfill its obligations. The ROE's policy for managing its exposure to the risk is to limit investments to those allowable by the Illinois Public Funds Investment Act. As of June 30, 2006, the ROE's investment in the State investment pool (Illinois Funds) was rated AAAm by Standard & Poor's.

Concentration of Credit Risk is the risk of loss attributed to the magnitude of a government's investment in a single issuer. The ROE's policy for mitigating the risk is to diversify the investment portfolio so that the failure of any one issue will not place an undue financial burden on the ROE. As of June 30, 2006, the ROE's investments are certificates of deposits with four local banks.

Custodial Credit Risk for investments is the risk that, in the event of a failure of the counterparty, the ROE will not be able to recover the value of the investments that are in the possession of an outside party. Originally, GASB Statement No. 3 discussed three categories of custodial credit risk as follows:

Category 1 includes investments that are insured or collateralized with securities held by the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 in its name.

Category 2 includes investments collateralized with securities held by the financial institution in the name of Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31.

Category 3 includes uninsured and uncollateralized investments or the collateral is held by the financial institution trust department but not in the name of Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31.

Although investments classified under the traditional risk categories of 1 and 2 have been determined under GASB Statement No. 40 to be exposed to only minimal risk, and, based on this conclusion, the GASB chose to limit disclosure of custodial credit risk to investments that meet the definition of "Category 3", the ROE has decided to include categories 1 and 2 in the discussion. The ROE does not have a policy for custodial credit risk that further limits custodial arrangements from what is required by the State of Illinois Public Funds Investment Act. The following table reflects the ROE's level of risk as of June 30, 2006:

NOTE 5 - DISTRIBUTIVE FUND INTEREST

Interest earned on the Distributive Fund's cash and investments is periodically distributed to each participating school district based on the school district's enrollment.

NOTE 6 - SALARIES AND PENSION PLAN CONTRIBUTIONS

The salaries of the Regional Superintendent and the Associate Regional Superintendent are paid by the State of Illinois. The salaries of all other employees of the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 are paid by Kane County. Pension plan contributions associated with these salaries are also paid either by the State of Illinois or Kane County.

The Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 reimburses Kane County for salaries paid as well as the employer contributions made to the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund (IMRF). Pension plan obligations for Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 employees (except for visual media personnel) are included in the statistics IMRF provides to Kane County.

NOTE 7 - RETIREMENT FUND COMMITMENTS

Teachers' Retirement System of the State of Illinois

The Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 participates in the Teachers' Retirement System of the State of Illinois (TRS). TRS is a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan that was created by the Illinois legislature for the benefit of Illinois public school teachers employed outside the city of Chicago. The Illinois Pension Code outlines the benefit provisions of TRS, and amendments to the plan can be made only by legislative action with the Governor's approval. The State of Illinois maintains primary responsibility for the funding of the plan, but contributions from participating employers and members are also required. The TRS Board of Trustees is responsible for the system's administration.

TRS members include all active nonannuitants who are employed by a TRS-covered employer to provide services for which teacher certification is required. The active member contribution rate through June 30, 2006 was 9.4 percent of their creditable earnings. These contributions, which may be paid on behalf of employees by the employer, are submitted to TRS by the employer. In addition, virtually all employers and members pay a contribution to the Teachers' Health Insurance Security (THIS) Fund, a separate fund in the State Treasury that is not a part of this retirement plan. The employer THIS Fund contribution was 0.6

percent during the year ended June 30, 2006, and the member THIS Fund health insurance contribution was 0.80 percent.

The State of Illinois makes contributions directly to TRS on behalf of the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31's TRS-covered employees.

• On-Behalf Contributions. The State of Illinois makes employer pension contributions on behalf of Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31. For the year ended June 30, 2006, the State of Illinois contributions were based on 7.06 percent of creditable earnings, and Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31, recognized revenue and expenditures of \$26,156 in pension contributions that the State of Illinois paid directly to TRS. For the years ended June 30, 2005 and June 30, 2004, the State of Illinois contribution rates as percentages of creditable earnings were 11.76 percent (\$38,442) and 13.98 percent (\$51,260), respectively.

The Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 makes three other types of employer contributions directly to TRS.

- 2.2 Formula Contributions. Employers contribute 0.58 percent of creditable earnings for the 2.2 formula change. Contributions for the year ended June 30, 2006 were \$1,984. Contributions for the years ended June 30, 2005, and June 30, 2004, were \$1,896 and \$2,118 respectively.
- Federal and Trust Fund Contributions. When TRS members are paid from federal and trust funds administered by Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31, there is a statutory requirement for Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 to pay an employer pension contribution from those funds. Under a policy adopted by the TRS Board of Trustees that was first effective in the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006, employer contributions for employees paid from federal and trust funds will be the same as the state contribution rate to TRS. For the year ended June 30, 2006, the employer pension contribution was 7.06 percent of salaries paid from federal and trust funds. For the two years ended June 30, 2005, the employer pension contribution was 10.5 percent of salaries paid from those funds. For the year ended June 30, 2006, salaries totaling \$108,574 were paid from federal and trust funds that required employer contributions of \$7,665. For the years ended June 30, 2005 and June 30, 2004, required Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 contributions were \$8,578 and \$13,306, respectively.
- Early Retirement Option (ERO). Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 is also required to make one-time employer contributions to TRS for members retiring under the Early Retirement Option (ERO). The payments vary depending on the age and salary of the member and under which ERO program the member retires. Under Public Act 94-0004, a "Pipeline ERO" program is provided for members to retire under the

same terms as the ERO program that expired June 30, 2005, provided they meet certain conditions and retire on or before July 1, 2007. If members do not meet these conditions, they can retire under the "Modified ERO" program which requires higher member and employer contributions to TRS. Also, under Modified ERO, Public Act 94-0004 eliminates the waiver of member and employer ERO contributions that had been in effect for members with 34 years of service (unless the member qualifies for the Pipeline ERO). Under the ERO program that expired on June 30, 2005 and the Pipeline ERO, the maximum employer contribution is 100 percent of the member's highest salary used in the final average salary calculation. Under the Modified ERO, the maximum employer contribution is 117.5 percent. Both the 100 percent and 117.5 percent maximums apply when the member is age 55 at retirement. For the year ended June 30, 2006, the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 paid \$0 to TRS for employer contributions under the Pipeline ERO and Modified ERO programs. For the years ended June 30, 2005 and June 30, 2004, the Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 paid \$0 and \$0, respectively in employer ERO contributions.

TRS financial information, an explanation of TRS' benefits, and descriptions of member, employer and State funding requirements can be found in the TRS *Comprehensive Annual Financial Report* for the year ended June 30, 2005. The report for the year ended June 30, 2006, is expected to be available in late 2006. The reports may be obtained by writing to the Teachers' Retirement System of the State of Illinois, P.O. Box 19253, 2815 West Washington Street, Springfield, IL 62794-9253. The most current report is also available on the TRS web site at trs.illinois.gov.

Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund

Employees participating in IMRF are required to contribute 4.50% of their annual covered salary. The member rate is established by State statute. Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31 is required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. The employer rate for calendar year 2005 was 0.00% percent of payroll. The employer contribution requirements are established and may be amended by the IMRF Board of Trustees. IMRF's unfunded actuarial accrued liability is being amortized as a level percentage of projected

payroll on a closed basis (overfunded liability amortized on open basis). The amortization period at December 31, 2005 was 5 years.

For December 31, 2005, Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31's annual pension cost of \$0 was equal to Kane County Regional Office of Education No. 31's required and actual contributions. The required contribution was determined as part of the December 31, 2003 actuarial valuation using the entry age actuarial cost method. The actuarial assumptions included (a) 7.50% investment rate of return (net of administrative expense), (b) projected salary increases of 4.00% a year, attributable to inflation, (c) additional projected salary increases ranging from 0.4% to 11.6% per year depending on age and service, attributable to seniority/merit, and (d) post-retirement benefit increases of 3% annually. The actuarial value of IMRF assets was determined using techniques that smooth the effects of short-term volatility in the market value of investments over a five-year period with a 15% corridor.

The assumptions used for the 2005 actuarial valuation were based on the 2002-2004 experience study.
